Enterprising Women of Color Business Center at YWCA O'ahu Announces Free Certification Course and New Program Director

HONOLULU, HI — The new Enterprising Women of Color (EWOC) Business Center at YWCA O'ahu is offering a FREE 10-week certification course to Hawai'i minority women-owned businesses, thanks to funding from the Minority Business Development Agency (MBDA).

The 10-week certification course — valued at \$3,000 but offered at no cost through MBDA funding — aims to expand contracting opportunities for local entrepreneurs. Classes will cover the benefits and application processes of primary federal government and national corporate certification programs. Course instructors Mari and José Villa of Villa Business Consulting, who have been working with these certification programs since 2008, provide expertise and in-depth knowledge to help participants navigate and thrive in these areas.





"Enterprising Women of Color" (EWOC) is a growing nationwide network established by MBDA to promote minority small business owners, with a focus on women entrepreneurs. Clients served by MBDA represent an inclusive group of African American, Asian-American, Native American, Hispanic/Latina, Pacific Islander and Hasidic Jewish business owners across the country.

The federal government sets aside approximately \$115 billion annually in contracts for certified women-owned, minority-owned, and veteran-owned small businesses. Generally, FORTUNE 1000 corporations also set aside contracts in these business categories. However, many Hawai'i small businesses are unaware that: (1) they can qualify to get certified federally and nationally; and (2) these certification programs would allow them to sell their products or services to government agencies or large corporations.

The MBDA EWOC Business Center at YWCA Oʻahu provides diverse and dynamic women entrepreneurs with resources, training, mentorship and events aimed at facilitating access to contracts and funding for medium-sized minority businesses. These opportunities are pivotal in ensuring the sustainability of our local small business community, especially during the difficult times presented by COVID-19.

New MBDA EWOC Business Center Director

The MBDA EWOC Business Center at YWCA O'ahu is led by director Shan Wirt, who joined the organization in December 2020. Wirt leverages her extensive background in law, risk management and communications to promote and increase participation in the Center's offerings.

Most recently, she was Senior Associate Attorney at Torkildson, Katz, Hetherington, Harris & Knorek and Associate Attorney at Ashford & Wriston. Shan has provided strategic legal and public relations counsel to clients ranging from FORTUNE 500 companies to local businesses in matters involving contract, real and intellectual property, procurement, employment, compliance, collections and tort issues.

Her communications work includes her role as the Marketing Communications Group & Program Risk Manager at Hawai'i Energy. In addition, providing pro bono services to the community — particularly to empower women and children in need — has been her priority. Some of the nonprofit and community organizations where she serves as a board member





include Windward Spouse Abuse Shelter, Hawaiʻi Women's Legal Foundation, Hawaiʻi Women Lawyers and the Hawaiʻi Supreme Court's Lawyers' Fund for Client Protection.

"I am excited to help launch this new Business Center to amplify minority women businesses. Small businesses are the heart of our community. By providing training, counseling and resources, our goal is to help businesses sharpen their competitive edge in Hawai'i and beyond," said Wirt.
